\$9.95 a month. The program is primarily for people who qualify for federal public assistance

internet speeds

at 25 megabits

per second at

the start of the

pandemic, the

minimum

threshold to

Communication

Commission's

definition of

broadband.

Critics argued

that the speed

wasn't enough

for students to

participate in

virtual classes

or for families

to make

telehealth

appointments

and take video

calls for work,

all of which

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became the norm during the pandemic.

Last month,

Comcast

announced it

would double

Internet

Essentials

download

speeds to 50

Mbps, increase

upload speeds

and speed up

the opening of

Lift Zones

following the

criticism.

Comcast also

gives 60 days of

free internet to

people who

signed up for

the program

during the pandemic.
